ob and Cheryl Alkema are hosting the first meeting of the year for the Inland Koi Society. This is going to be a great meeting because it going to be fully packed with activities. In November 2006, If you remember, the Alkemas hosted more than 80 members in a fantastic Thanksgiving IKS meeting. That should be incentive enough if you were there, but they are welcoming us again to their incredible house, yard, and koi pond. In case it rains, Bob has an 1800 Sq. Ft. garage so we will be able to meet even if it rains.

Cheryl designed and decorated the house from top to bottom. She has a great eye for detail and color, but is very humble about it. The house is about 7500 Sq. Ft. They started this project by purchasing thirty-one acres. The place where the house was to sit had a huge granite boulder sitting right where the great room is located now. This twenty foot high boulder had to be blasted apart and pushed to the side of the property. The rocks were later used in landscaping and pond construction. Bob terraced eighteen acres and planted 2,500 Hass Avocado Trees. When the trees mature he hopes the orchard will pay for property taxes and expenses on the house. his is the start of a new year and their Christmas decorations have all be put away. A 400 watt Aqua U. V. keeps the water clear of algae. The original idea was a water garden and they were given some goldfish. Then Bob saw two Sanke at California Koi and decided to give them to Cheryl for Christmas that year. Koi-fever took hold... Their pond is really beautiful and viewable from many rooms in the house, especially from the Great Room. The Alkemas have a nice selection of Kohaku, Sanke, Shiro Utsuri, and Ochiba Shigure to name a few. 

FEEDING IN COLD WATER



Fish will feel 'hungry' in cold water, even down to the mid forties however the enzymes needed for the digestion of most Koi food will be lacking. The fish will eat, sometimes fully, and then languor in the cold water as their metabolism slogs the food through. In very cold water, fish simply don't eat. If the food is going to be processed by "cold" fish with impaired metabolism, it has made sense to most people to offer foods which are easily and quickly digestible and which contain minimal residue to stall the gut. Over the years, soluble plant proteins like wheat germ were found to be effective, and so were Cheerios. Fish love Cheerios, especially the Honey Nut Cheerios. Try it, you will see they go for the darker, tastier(?) Honey Nut Cheerios over the plain ones. And they can tell when you buy generic Cheerios. But it's okav.

The point of Cheerios is that they supply some useful energy, with minimal nitrogen to strain a cold biological filtration system, and the fish like 'em. A lot. In my own pond, I've noticed that Cheerios are sort of fattening when offered with regular food year round, so if you want to put some weight on a big female fish, especially through her face, give her some Cheerios with her regular diet through the year.

In cold water I recommend that you:

- 1. Reduce feeding drastically in water under 70 but above 64 Fahrenheit. Feed sparingly once per day or every other day.
- 2. Watch for elevations in Ammonia because of a stalled bio filtration.
- 3. Feed Cheerios once, every other day in water under 64 but above 53 DF.
- 4. Stop feeding when water temps are consistently under 55 - 53 DF
- 5. Resume feeding Cheerios in the Spring when water temps are consistently at or above 55 53 DF

Special winter foods are not required.

After dinner, Mac talked about their place and their pond. The pond and waterfall were really nice. The fish were beautiful. Mac explained he named the place Three Angels Ranch after the ladies from Charley's Angels, a popular TV show. The ranch was very popular with the guests. After

Mac's talk, he invited everyone to watch feeding time at the zoo. Kelly, and Sabrina are responsible for animal feeding and cleanup. They led about 2/3rds of the guests on a ranch tour, and feeding.

After Mac's talk, Emily Yost, of Toba Fountains gave a presentation on the fountain. 

DID YOU KNOW?

Yellow Jackets do not lose their stingers, so they can sting repeatedly when disturbed. It hurts! And these guys are drawn to water so be careful when working around the pond.

An occasional koi will have the allergic reaction to Yellow Jacket sting when they try to eat them. Not all koi will be harmed, but, yes, it can happen.

Be careful collecting water plants in the wild: water hemlock is toxic to koi. It isn't sold in nurseries, thank goodness. Herbal Water Conditioners, such as Sabbactisun and Parazoryne, can effectively prevent bacterial and parasitic disease when used promptly, without adding toxins to the water.



Burying the hatchet was a symbolic step in a movement to bring the water garden and koi pond worlds a step closer for the betterment of the industry.

THE SECRETS OF SALT

The first secret of using salt in the pond is that koi and goldfish are freshwater, not saltwater fish. That tells me that they do not naturally live in a salt water environment. So, if you are keeping a salt level in the pond year 'round, you are not being helpful to the fish. Does this surprise you? Let me explain.

When you maintain a level of salt in your pond, you will create an unnatural environment, one of brackish water conditions, meaning the water is neither freshwater nor saltwater. Brackish water is what is found where the rivers meet the ocean and there are fish and other animals which are greatly adapted to these conditions. They thrive in brackish water. Brackish says nothing about the quality of the water. It simply means there is a measurable amount of salt in it, but not quite the amount of a sea water environment.

There are parasites and bacteria that are also quite adapted to a brackish water environment. They will begin to appear in your pond and might even seem to be "salt resistant" mutates, but they are simply another type of parasite (or bacteria) that would not naturally be found in your pond. And guess what? Salting the pond more heavily will not eliminate them. It will only make them feel more at home while your fish feel less and less at home. These are not super parasites or mystery bacteria, they are quite normally found elsewhere and now they are found in your pond.

Hobbyists have long known the benefits of using non-iodized salt to regulate osmotic balance which helps their fish heal and reduces stress. They know it kills the majority of parasites normally found in a (freshwater) fish pond and at what levels it works best. None of that has really changed. Salt is the miracle cure and the first line of defense. It should be in everyone's pond medicine chest. It needs to be stored in a dry place for future needs.

The better use of salt would be not to keep a measurable salt level in the pond, but to add salt as needed. Use salt for up to three or four weeks maximum. Then, when this need has passed, you need to remove it by doing 50% water changes; and I suggest three consecutive 50% water changes, using dechlorinator if you are on city water. In this way you will not promote the brackish water environment and your fish will live happily, healthier in their natural environment.




bership includes several folks who have been officers of the AKCA, and have worked on the association's magazine/ newsletter - Koi USA. Zuma and I are now members of that Board as well.


