This month we return to Fountain Valley and, with a better idea of how long it takes to get there, we should all be on time! No, we're not going back to Inland Koi, but about 10 minutes further out the 405 to visit *Mark & Charlene Whelan* and their beautiful pond.

e'll need your chairs and potluck dishes to have seating and lunch for everyone, and we'll also want a count of how many will attend...but more about that later. We trust the heat wave will have passed and the pleasant coastal influences will prevail. Mark's U-shaped pond is part of a lovely covered patio; actually, it surrounds the patio so that you can't help but watch the koi wherever you sit.

ne might ask about our hosts, "Who are the Whelans?" Besides being members since 2010, they have been married 35 years. Mark has been involved with koi for many years. In AKCA, he was Assistant Chair for five years, then chaired the organization for a term. He was editor of *KoiUSA*, and also led ZNA-Orange County for six years. Enough to establish his credibility as being knowledgeable about koi. Charlene was by him all the time, working — and she still works —full time as both a stylist and a detailer on some really cool boats.

Mark attended Glendale College and then planned to transfer to Long Beach State for his BA and credential, but was surprised to be rejected. Trying to figure out why, he found that transcripts for a Mark Paul Whelan had been sent instead of those for Mark Philip Whelan. With that cleared up, he got in, finished, and taught 4th and 6th grade for many years, admittedly enjoying the yet innocent lower grade a bit more. He enjoyed drama and had the lead in his senior play; and he has recently been involved in local theatre.

nly 20 years old, the Whelans' pond was the first project when Mark & Charlene bought the house in 1997 — first, that is, *after* he ripped out everything in both the front and back yards. It is 50 feet long with a 22-foot wide waterfall on the outside curve as it all wraps around the patio. That may sound like a rather impressive waterfall, but it is only *six inches* high, providing just the right sound of a healthy stream. There are three bottom drains and two skimmers; two 1/4-horse pumps turn 11,000 gph to keep it fresh. There are four barrel filters, two s sand filters and two filled with Japanese matt (similar to *Matala*). Patio and pond are both covered by a simple shade structure.

ext door, at *Burt & Gloria Ballou*'s home, are a pair of intimidating ponds and a small sign that declares, "THIS ISN'T A GARDEN ~ IT'S A BOTANICAL MASTERPIECE." A veritable jungle of tropical plants obscures clear views of the ponds, called *Ballou Bayou* and *Ballou's Lagoon*. The first is 3800-gallons large, covered by a slatted shade structure, while the second is 22,250-gallons huge, covered by a fairly dense shade cloth. The combination of shade and water has created a perfect microclimate for myriad ferns, cycads and other shade-and humidity-loving tropical plants. [This is a place I would like Alex Franco to see; I think he'd love it!]

E ach pond's filter equipment is found in the filter house opposite the lagoon; a few people at a time can squeeze

into it to hear Burt explain his filters. There's also a greenhouse and shade garden, plus a marvelous collection of cactus, tenderly tended by Gloria [and I wonder how!]

and if two great ponds — or three or four — aren't enough for one day, we're offering Mark a chance to shamelessly



promote his current employer, BevMo. He only works one day a week, Saturday, but he loves it! Sooo....

e're offering a special treat for those who wish to participate. Mark Whelan is an experienced wine person: he hosts BevMo's weekly wine tastings, and has graciously offered to do a private tasting for us. Not everyone needs to be involved, but those who do wish to partake should let me know by Friday afternoon, July 20, so Mark can have enough wine and glasses on hand. You may bring your favorite glass, if you like.

Indeed, wine may not be at the top of the list of things you need to know about koi, but a glass of wine shared with friends, while sitting by a pond *watching* the koi, may be the best part of any day.

o one has to stay for the wine...we may plan it as the last part of the meeting so those who don't want to do the tasting may leave a bit early without missing the important closing events — the drawing and announcements.

SEEDING A NEW IKS OUTREACH

At the July Board meeting, *Theo Zoetemelk* spoke an unwelcome truth and then suggested an interesting possible solution:

IKS is admittedly made up of mostly 'mature' people, and we need to get younger people interested in the hobby to make sure there is a future for us. And if we get younger people involved, we will also be benefitting the breeders and vendors that we rely on.

His proposal was simple:

Because we didn't give away our scholarship monies this year, we should invest it in high schools with Ag or FFA programs and see if they would build koi ponds as another way to teach kids about caring for animals. Not everyone can raise a pig or a cow at home, but if kids get interested in koi at school, they might get their parents to build ponds at home. There's a future!

Ed Broomfield agreed that koi people tend to be 40+, and the way to get people involved is by incrementalism — walking them through it. Since Theo is from Norco, probably the strongest 'rural' or farming town close by, he was asked to approach the Ag teacher at Norco to test the waters. Wow! What a response!

Evidently there was already an interest in pond building at Norco High, and they were thrilled at the contact. *Carole Lindsey* is the Ag instructor and she said they had started a pond — got the hole dug — but stopped when they realized they didn't know what they were doing. She already has seven or eight kids good for a start-up program. Theo gave her the Koi 101 booklet as a basic text for writing a curriculum and offered help along the way. She prefers a hands-on approach to teaching, and Theo agreed.

Theo, Larry Leverett and Nick Milfeld met to talk further about the plan, and Theo had already reached out to Ed Brown for help, too, and he offered to help them fold in a liner when the time comes. The agreed goal is to have the students make their own up-flow filter system using plans in the AKCA Guides to Construction and to Filtration. They can learn all aspects of the plumbing needed and reuse filter water for irrigation in their other projects; they can landscape their pond, learning what plants can and cannot be used around a pond. Ms Lindsey is already teaching Ag Mechanics-1 and Advanced, and this project would add another useful application.

It would be interesting to know what other schools in IKS's "area of influence" would be interested, and if vendors would get involved. It's an outreach opportunity with great potential!

Before You Build ~ Pond Building Concerns

When thinking about pond construction, there are a number of items to consider even before the subject of filters.

Consider its location: How much sun will it receive, are there trees nearby that may provide shade (or be a burden with leaves falling in or roots that could damage the pond)? Avoid nearby roofs that might have drainage that could enter the pond and be harmful to your fish and plants. Try to avoid a low area of the yard to prevent ground water from entering the pond, and have its perimeter higher than the surrounding area to keep out runoff. Ideally the location should be some place that you can enjoy-closer to, and perhaps where you can see it from the inside of your home.

Size does matter. Despite the recent beautiful weather, we do have cold spells. Depth should be a minimum of 3 feet, but preferably 4-6 feet deep. The volume depends on many factors-how much space, filter size, number of fish and plants planned and cost. The calculation is length times width times depth (in feet) times 7.54, equals the number of gallons. Ponds may be preformed, concrete (it must first "cure,"), fiberglass, or the newer spray on polyurea.

Maintenance and Design: Ask any Koi keeper and I bet any one would rather be enjoying their Koi than performing pond maintenance; keep it as maintenance free as possible. Use bottom drains to pick up the detritus and ensure that the pond bot-

tom slopes towards your bottom drains (at least 1 to 2 inches per foot) spacing them 8 to 12 feet apart. I am amazed at the businesses that sell supplies and build ponds who insist that bottom drains are not needed! Plan a skimmer to pick up floating debris, and locate it at the opposite end from the waterfall. Waterfalls help aerate the water and keep the water in motion. Jets around the pond also provide aeration, minimize or eliminate dead spots (stagnant water) and exercise your Koi as they swim through or against the current.

Consider a pre-filter. This will remove much of the solids and debris before water reaches the biofilter, decreasing the need to clean the biofilter and reducing the chance of it clogging up and having reduced efficiency. In my opinion, the best type of pre-filter is a below ground vortex. This cone shaped filter has water spinning around and causes settlement of solids. Once water leaves the pre-filter, it uses a pump to deliver to the biofilter. Here you need media to allow the proliferation of nitrosomas and nitrobacter bacteria to convert ammonia to nitrites and nitrites to nitrates. There are many excellent types of filters available or you can construct your own. Finally, water is returned to the pond. If you are considering a UV light, here is where it would be placed (after the biofilter).

When building a pond, whether it is your first or a rebuild, spend the time to read, look at many ponds, plan very carefully, examine your budget and don't rush. The extra investment you put in now will reap many benefits in the future.

Pond Construction Types

Pond building is a project most of us will undertake at some point as we continue to raise Koi. Many of us first started with the introduction of a water feature, added plants, perhaps some goldfish and then Koi. A few of us bought a house where the prior owner had some type of pond or fountain, and we too evolved into having a Koi pond. Whatever way you arrived here, we all wrestled with similar questions: how large, how much to spend what kind of filters, and what do we make it out of.

The simplest ponds are made of preformed polyethylene. The corners are already rounded, the bottoms sloped, bottom drains are already in place and all that's needed is its installation, a waterfall and water. Its disadvantages are its fixed shape and size, and the risk of pH crash as this material is inert (if the entire pond, return and waterfall are made of the same material). While it may seem to be a simple option, the preformed ponds are very hard to get level while also being well supported. Another problem are the plant shelves, which make perfect places for Herons and other predators to wade and kill your Koi.

Another easier pond to build is a liner pond. Here you have fairly low cost, as well as shape and size flexibility. It can suffer from leaks from plumbing fixtures through it, and tears or punctures. It may wrinkle and fold, interfering with water circulation and catching and trapping detritus, and it is difficult to hide the liner that extends above the water line. Lke polyethylene, may result in pH crash. Do not build plant shelves when designing a liner pond, again because it will encourage predators. Sides should be basically vertical, and ideally, all Koi ponds should be

2 feet deeper than the deepest frost depth in your area.

Fiberglass has the advantages of flexibility of size and shape, smooth corners with no folds or wrinkles. It has few problems with leaks, is very durable and can be remodeled. It can be quite expensive, may leach some chemicals that are harmful to Koi if the resin is not fully cured, and it too is at risk for pH crash.

Concrete ponds tend to be very popular. They are quite durable and can be in any size or shape. They do take a bit of planning (and expense). They require rebar for support and strength. Once installed, concrete must "cure." This process strengthens the concrete reducing the chances of cracks and leaks. Compounds that leach out of concrete will raise the pH to lethal levels, uless the pond is cured. Curing requires adding water and muriatic acid. Some opt for a liner or spray-on lining over their concrete. Of course, the advantage of properly cured concrete is that the pond may never be prone to a pH crash, and will also have sufficient alklinity to insure healthy fish and filters.

Ponds produced out of cinderblock or bricks need a plaster coat or some other type of waterproofing material. Any type of masonry pond that needs a final plaster coat must have it done all at once. This is because in order for it to be waterproof, all edges of that plaster have to cure at the same time.

When planning on building a pond, whether your first or last, carefully weigh the pros and cons of each type of construction, utilize the expertise of K.O.I., and consider taking the Pond Construction course #202 BEFORE you build. Spending time to learn in advance will save time and money, and help you to get exactly the pond that you desire.

Alstroemeria Revisited



Last month we talked about the *Alstroemeria* plant that everyone liked in Francine's garden. With the high heat we've been having, the seed pods are drying out quickly and are ready to harvest.

When fully dry, not slightly green or tacky to touch, they will pop off easily between two fingers and can be stored in a covered container until they are planted. Some are so ripe they explode in my hand, or I hear them pop in the covered cup where I keep them. Every week I pull out the exploded pods and transfer the seeds to a smaller container.

You can pick the seeds almost daily to control where they end up...in the lawn they're mowed down and wasted. When all pods have been picked from a stem, pull the stem out of the ground to encourage more growth and make room for new seeds to sprout. Enjoy!


