Club Koi of the Year nominations require that you bring a high resolution photograph of the Koi to the meeting. You can find the contest rules on the AKCA.org website. Club members Cindy and Tom Graham's Kujaku, representing the IKS, won second place out of 104 clubs in the Club Koi of the Year contest this past June at the AKCA Seminar in Jacksonville, Florida.

OCTOBER POND & HOST PROFILE

Tom and Zuma Ross in Riverside, CA

TOM AND ZUMA ROSS are the hosts for our October General Meeting. They moved to this beautiful two-story house in the La Sierra area of Riverside in 2001 and are especially proud of their two new ponds, which have been years in the planning. They are both very active in and big supporters of IKS. Tom is on our Board of Directors and a certified Koi Health Advisor, and he was recently named Vice Chairman of AKCA. Zuma is the IKS Secretary, attends all club business meetings, and has designed or helped design several club T-shirts. They both have college degrees and maintained successful careers before retiring.

The Ross' say their new ponds, which were built by Leo of Leo's Construction, have exceeded their expectations. Both Tom and Zuma had a hand in designing the ponds. Tom wanted the formal pond to be waist-high so he and Zuma could interact with the koi, and he wanted it to be close enough to the house to be seen from their eating area. They also wanted an



informal pond with both lilies and koi located where they could sit under the shade of a tree and just relax.

Tom, being an engineer, knows all about the plumbing of a pond, so he did most of the filters and pumps. On his formal pond, which is concrete, he has a ³/₄ hp pump that pulls water from a bottom drain and flows to a pressurized vortex microstrainer, then to a bubble bead filter, through two 40 watt UV lights, and lastly to the waterfall. His informal garden pond is a liner pond

with two 3" bottom drains that gravity flow to an in-ground vortex with a microstrainer. A 1/3 hp pump pulls water from the vortex and pushes it through a bubble bead filter, through two 40 watt UV lights and back to the waterfall. The Ross's fish are beautiful and happy koi who fit comfortably in the new ponds.



They tend to spoil or worry about them like we all do, and I noticed, as Tom pointed out different koi. that you could hear his deep unending passion as he talked.

Tom and Zuma have many hobbies and belong to several other clubs, one being the Velocette Motorcycle Club. They

went to the Laguna Seca U.S. MotoGP (Grand Prix) in Monterey and the Isle of Man TT (Tourist Trophy) races this year because of their interest with motorcycles. They recently traveled 1,300 miles on their Harley-Davidson Road Glide Motorcycle to Priest River on the Ponderay River in Idaho, where Zuma's sister lives.

Tom and Zuma are especially knowledgeable in the classifications and descriptions of wild mushrooms. Tom lived in Germany and grew up searching for mushrooms; Zuma's sister, Sandy, got her hooked on mushrooming and joining the Spokane Mushroom Club. It makes a great hobby for Tom and Zuma to share, but they are very cautious of harvesting Califor-



nia garden mushrooms. In certain seasons they love to go trekking through the forests on the edge of Washington and Idaho where her sister lives, which is a primo mushroom hunting area, to collect edible mushrooms.

They say once you spot one, there are usually more and as you see them, you get a sense of discovery. There is one mushroom called Amanita that has a red or bright yellow cap with white dots - beautiful but especially deadly. On the other hand the matsutake (Japanese: pine mushroom), is a prized and very fragrant mushroom in Japan.

Zuma is a highly intelligent, curious and creative person, born in California. She learned a lot about plants from her deceased, legally blind father who would manually feel or crush plants everywhere they went. She has developed a weakness for uncommon plants and she prefers a Mediterranean plant garden design, which she has incorporated into her own vard, but wants to keep the surrounding hillsides of their one-acre property natural. Zuma has a vast botanical understanding and her garden proudly displays it. I wrote down many names of plants, trees, and flowers as we walked her yard, but there are too many to list in this space; if asked, I'm sure she would love to take anyone on a tour.

When I asked Tom what advice he would give to interested koi hobbyists, he stated, "Make your pond small enough that you can catch your fish fairly easily if they need to be inspected, but big enough to keep your interest in the hobby ever-growing, without having the expense of rebuilding your pond."


You will really enjoy seeing these two types of ponds and the extensive horticulture surrounding them. The weather has been very comfortable lately and it should turn out to be a



GENERAL MEETING/BUS TRIP SEP Happenings at this Event



The Chandlers' pond occupies half the backyard, screened on three sides by tall plantings and the garage, with it and the filter equipment shaded by a triangular "sails." Their open-sided orchid house was in full bloom, the amazing flowers competing with their brilliant koi for your attention. Brenda was a gracious hostess, greeting us for our mid-morning coffee break with rolls and assorted drinks. Theirs is a compact yard that exudes tranquility: calming waters, graceful koi, comfortable seating... what a place to spend a morning!



The "Ballou Lagoon" is just part of a 30,000-gallon-plus system of three ponds in an almost overgrown tropical paradise. Unseen and unimagined from the street, Burt's ponds are part swimming pool conversion, part original design; they are pristine waters and home to 30 spectacular Koi in the 24"-30" range. And for all the *topicality* of it, wife Gloria indulges her passion for cacti and succulents on the other side of the yard.




Mark Whalen keeps a very practical crescent-shaped pond for his 15 showquality koi, who get their exercise swimming its 50-foot length . Only five feet wide, this nine-year old pond was designed so the fish could be easily caught and easily viewed; he lights up each end of the pond with MR16 halogen bulbs for night viewing. For netting, Mark can walk the full length of the pond's leading edge, while a 15-foot wide waterfall curves around the opposite edge and quietly lets 11,000 gph of water cascade a mere 18-20 inches over pieced flagstone. Mark feeds his koi 10 to 12 times a day at present, but will gradually reduce that as winter approaches.



Eastern Nishikigoi was our next stop. We were greeted with the offer of a 20% discount on everything in the store, and many of us took advantage, buying fish, food and products. ENKoi is a premier dealer, with numerous outdoor concrete vats of fish in varying sizes, plus waterplants, indoor retail, tropical fish and a few display ponds. Mark was impressed with their Bakki Trickle Tower filters, similar to what was seen at the Chandlers' home, and all made guesses at the prices on a wonderful pair of huge Koi (wrong; only \$4000 each, but Ken wants to keep them to breed.)





The catch is that the contest is only open to current subscribers to KoIUSA (as of November 30, 2008), which means a \$20 'entry fee' payable to IKS if you are not already subscribing. But do it NOW: entries must be received by November 30, 2008!

THE DO'S AND DON'TS OF KOI PHOTOGRAPHY:

DO...

- Photograph Koi where there are no reflections on the water. Spend time walking around the pond to find the best place, which will depend on the time of day.
- •Use a high vantage point. Stand on the pond's edge, a bridge or steps for overhead shots of Koi.
- •Use a polarizing filter to remove reflections, but be prepared for a much darker image in the viewfinder. A polarizing filter cuts down the light reaching the film or sensor so you'll need a slower shutter speed or wider aperture to compensate. Slower shutter speeds increase the risk of blurred photos. Wider apertures reduce the infocus area to the front and rear of the object focused on, so you may not obtain a sharp image of the whole Koi.
- Point the camera at a grey card to set the correct exposure.
- If possible, use a shutter speed of 1/125 second or faster for hand-held shots, which should prevent blurring from camera shake.

DO N'T...

- Risk a splashing or a ducking for you or your camera. Use the camera neck strap at all times. Always store camera accessories away from the pond, and move away from the pond's edge to change filters, films or lenses.
- Photograph in bright sunshine unless you have to. Wait for shadowless light.
 Rely on the camera's exposure meter to calculate the right settings.
 Use very high ISO speed otherwise the photos will be very grainy.
 Be mean with film. The only way to get good shots is to take plenty of pictures.

Although these suggestions are without a doubt, good for your pond and garden, when taking pictures for the AKCA "Koi of the Year" contest, be sure to transfer your koi into a blue container used especially for koi photography, then utilize suggestions that apply.

You are welcome to bring a standard size, like 4x6 picture (do not put your name on your photos-well post-note it), of three different Koi (one fish per photo) to the October General Meeting and then every <u>family</u> present at this meeting will be able to vote for one favorite.

The winning Koi picture will then be sent to AKCA to compete against all of the clubs' Koi of the Year at the February 2009 AKCA Seminar in San Diego.

Do you often notice someone in our club always helping or just being there? Do they smile readily and talk comfortably with others?

Give them a huge "Thank You" by nominating them as our "Kelly

Houston Koi Person of the Year." (This may be an individual or a couple.) If elected, they will receive \$250 to help them attend the AKCA Seminar to receive their recognition. CHLORINE KILLS 22 KOI AT JAPA-NESE GARDEN, BUT ONE SURVIVES By Jeanette Steele UNION-TRIBUNE STAFF WRITER October 10, 2008

BALBOA PARK – The lone survivor in the koi pond at the Japanese Friendship Garden is swimming a little erratically this week.

A burnt streak on his black-and-white tail bears witness to the accidental chlorine poisoning that killed 22 of his buddies Tuesday at the Balboa Park landmark. "He's not happy," said Linda Pluth, a member of the Koi Club of San Diego,

which helps maintain the pond.

No one knows why this jumbo *kumonryu*, or dragon koi, lived through the night Monday while the pond slowly filled with an oversupply of city water because of an equipment malfunction.

Without anyone there to treat the water, the chlorine burned the fishes'gills and suffocated them. A gardener arriving early Tuesday morning found the koi floating.

"It's just a tremendous loss. We kind of think of them as living pieces of art," said Lovelynn Hansen of the Japanese Friendship Garden Society of San Diego.

The koi were brightly colored behemoths, weighing up to 18 pounds and measuring as long as 2 feet from speckled nose to gossamer tail fin. They were considered show-quality because of their size and brilliant orange-and-

black dappling, and each fish was worth \$800 to \$3,500.

But to people who love the pond, the value couldn't be measured in dollars. "It was probably our main attraction," Hansen said. "People got to know these koi – and people have their favorites. We kind of think of them as our pets." People say mature koi can recognize their owners and that some live for decades.

A member of the Koi Club of San Diego has lent several fish from his own collection to fill the Balboa Park pond for now. It will cost \$25,000 to \$30,000 to restock. Many fish that died came from Japan, and the replacements probably will come from dealers around the world.

"We are actually trying to work out those details with our insurance company," Hansen said.

Kindhearted koi owners take note: Donations of fish won't help. Club member Jack Chapman said koi transported from ponds with a different chemistry could sicken those at this pond. That's why there's no plan to move koi from the park's Lily Pond to the Friendship Garden.

And "those are not show fish," said Chapman, a certified koi health adviser. "This was a very nice collection of koi. It's nothing short of tragic to lose these fish. I've been taking care of them for the better part of three years."

Koi club members are brokenhearted about the die-off for another reason: In February, anyone who's anyone in the koi world will gather in San Diego for a breeders convention and show.

Friendship Garden officials were already raising money for a major expansion of the $2\frac{1}{2}$ -acre site. The plan is to open 11 more acres on an adjoining hillside.

But raising money for the koi will be a top priority now. The 550-member nonprofit probably will hold a benefit in the near future.


