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JULY POND AND HOST PROFILE

Nick & Peggy Milfeld - Riverside, CA

Nick © Peggy Milfeld have invited IKS ers to hold the July General Meeting in their exquisite g

members to hold the July General Meeting in their exquisite garden. Many of us have visited the Milfelds' garden and pond before: it has been on two IKS Pond Tours and on the Riverside Flower Show Garden Tour. It has seen two weddings, three receptions, a Women's Ministry Luncheon & Fashion Show, fifteen years of Pathway Christian Church Easter breakfasts, a fund raiser for Alvord School District, and twice been on the RCRMC Spring Garden Tour. Their yard was featured on a night-light garden tour, written about in the Press Enterprise Newspaper several times, and featured in many other events.

Nick, Peggy, and their three children built two ponds at their last home, and a prerequisite for the 1987 move to Riverside was a property that would support waterfalls (like in a forest). Nick's 'beautiful forest' vision was invisible to three of four landscape architects facing the flat, barren half acre and the 2-to-1 slope to a block-wall lot line left by the developers. But tons of rearranging, and truckloads of topsoil and amendments later, the trees got planted and the digging began.

The real adventure begins as you enter the back-



yard where you will find yourself magically transported to a beautiful forest of tall whispering pine, cedar and redwood trees. Nick has always said his woodland yard is the result of his inability to move Milfelds' Azalea Nursery, his wholesale family business, to the mountain

environment he would have preferred. Instead, when he and Peggy moved their business and home to Riverside from Temple City, he stubbornly brought the forest to his back yard, thus also creating a lush microclimate for ferns, azaleas, rhodies and hydrangea. Recently the garden had a makeover, with trees trimmed and thinned to allow more sunlight to bathe the wealth of various flowers and trees. Be sure to take the trail that reaches into the trees among ferns where you can get a good view of the series of terraced waterfalls cascading down to the Milfelds' spectacular gunite Koi pond and swimming pool. Edging rock and waterfalls were all hand formed of concrete and painted to support an idea of naturalness. The plantings, additions and care are done by Nick and Peggy with lots of love and a pride in gardening, with constant shifts according to weather or wishes.

Their 11,000 gallon pond, with two waterfalls



and an island, is to the left, and a swimming pool, with a spa and waterfall, is to the right. There is a deck in the middle which makes the pond and pool look like they are joined. Two different filter systems filter the pond. Two bottom drains feed a combination of three vortexes by Patio Ponds, with a ¼ hp Sequence pump and an Aqua UV with 120

watts back to the pond through jets. Two bottom drains and a skimmer feed the second filter system, driven by two ¼ hp Sequence pumps, first to a pair of pre-filters built by Bob Walters, then to another set of UV lights, up to a three-chamber up-flow rock-gravel-silica sand filter to polish the water; then back to the pond via a waterfall. These systems run 24/7. Nick also has a 2 hp pump that pulls water from two other bottom drains and goes straight to the giant waterfall, which runs only when there is an audience.

Nick has been our long-time club Treasurer, and

Peggy greets you at the sign-in table at each meeting, helps proof the Inland Koi Connection, and has created the IKS Pond Tour booklets each year. Because of their dedication and constant involvement, both have been elected as an IKS Person of the Year in the past. You couldn't find a better example of unselfish giving and friendship in our club than the Milfelds.

Nick and Peggy have a beautiful swimming pool,



and with this heat, it might be a refreshing treat to dip your feet in. Of course, it is an option for 'kids' of any age to swim, but please bring your own suits and towels. The pool is only 4½ feet deep, so there is NO DIVING, but kids are free to play in the water-

fall. The house rule is to go to the bathroom before a swim. Please remind the kids.

Since June, July, August and maybe September in the Inland Empire are extremely exhausting with high outdoor temperatures, the IKS Board of Directors have directed a time change; hoping to catch a cooler time of day. So, this month, the starting time of the meeting will be changed from 2:00 PM to 3:00 PM and then plan to end at 6:00 PM



There was dead silence for a moment. Then a deep, masculine voice answered meekly, "No, ma'am, I'm just reading the meter."



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

It's not sushi, but you won't believe what Dr. Bob does with a scalpel and a fish By TOM BERG

THIS IRVINE VETERINARIAN ONCE REMOVED A 3-LB TUMOR FROM AN 11LB FISH. HIS PRICIEST PATIENT WAS AN \$80,000 KOI.

KOI KICHI

Dr. Bob never intended to be a fish surgeon.

He was your typical dog-and-cat veterinarian who'd seen a few fish when he got called to a koi show. It seems a woman in the finals had a koi with a torn fin so naturally the reaction was: EVERYBODY PANIC!

The real fear was that a woman might actually win (in 1995, koi shows were an all-male domain), but the expressed fear was that her wounded fish might have a deadly bacterial disease – aeromonas– that could spread through the tanks.

Dr. Bob rushed over.

"It was obvious this fish got caught in a net," Dr. Bob says. "It was a very minor injury, but people were panicking."

Tammy Davis decided to withdraw her koi anyway – just in case. Then she asked the young fish doctor to check the rest of her koi stock at home – just in case. They talked for four hours. Soon they were dating, then married.

"They call it *koi kichi,* which means koi crazy," Dr. Bob says of the passion koi owners exhibit. "Well, that's how I met Tammy."

Soon Dr. Bob had koi kichi himself. He fell in love with Orange County's koi community – which includes the oldest koi club in America.

"The people were nice," he says. "They had beautiful fish. I was willing to learn from them and they were willing to learn from me."

He introduced a new concept to these koi-crazy owners: science. It was a turning point.

"Up to that point, it was hit or miss," says Pam Spindola, of North Tustin, a nationally known koi judge and former grand-champion winner. "We called it the shotgun approach. If a fish had an abrasion, you'd start with simple Mercurochrome."

Dr. Bob tested for viruses and parasites. He introduced microscopic exams and the judicious use of antibiotics on fish. And more.

When he encountered an 11-pound koi with a 3-pound tumor, he introduced Orange County to fish surgery.

SEEING IS BELIEVING

Yes, he's performed fish cancer surgery, facial reconstructions and fin splints. He's operated on an \$80,000 fish. Appeared on Animal Planet's "Beverly Hills Vet." And even played a fish's "favorite music" to help it recover from surgery.

Tammy was there. The owner kept calling, asking

how her koi was recuperating. Tammy said it seemed happy but wasn't eating. To which the owner replied: "You need to turn on opera music. And sing to the fish. And you need wine!"

That's how its owners ended each day – listening to opera, sharing a glass of wine and sitting by their koi pond. Well ...

"As soon as I turned on the opera," Tammy says, "the fish started eating."

What does Dr. Bob, a nationally known fish surgeon and lecturer, think about all this?

"Seeing is believing," he says. "I don't know how to say it other than that."

The truth is, fish have all five senses we do plus they can feel vibrations in the water. Tammy's koi recognized the sound of her door latch when she walked out to feed them. Other koi recognize their owner's footsteps. They'll swim up and settle on top of their hands.

"These fish can live 30 years," says Dr. Bob. "They become part of the family, as much as the family dog."

Before you get too lathered up, a quick history lesson: Two centuries ago, if a vet even looked at a dog, the act would've been seen as borderline insane. The first veterinary college opened in Lyon, France, in 1762, to keep the primary engines of transportation and war – that is, horses – running. Over the next century, vets extended their clientele to cows, sheep and other farm animals to assist agriculture.

It really wasn't until Americans fell in love with "Lassie" in the 1950s that sick dogs were no longer put down. Since then, the U.S. pet industry has grown into a \$41 billion-a-year business that includes not only dog surgery, but cat surgery, bird surgery and so on.

Can fish really be far behind?

"I have to tolerate a lot of jokes," Greg Lewbart, a professor of aquatic animal medicine at North Carolina State University in Raleigh, says of the typical flushing and grilling jokes that accompany talk about sick fish. "That's just part of people getting accustomed to it."

Lewbart knows people who've taught goldfish to limbo (swimming under a bar); people who sleep on the floor next to their aquarium with a sick fish; and people who've spent \$500 to heal a \$1 fish.

Why? Money is not a factor, he says. People spend thousands on sick dogs and cats they got for free. He says he'd easily spend \$2,000 to save the snake he's had since 1982 – adding, "This is an animal that probably wouldn't know me from you!"

Why then? What is it?

POND # 1 IN CORONA

Owners: Ed Kushner and Linda Vanore

Wanting both koi and water garden in a natural setting, this flag lot provided great borrowed landscape on all sides - an unrestricted view into the Cleveland National Forest! The pond stretches across most of the backyard, turning the patio into a private retreat. A solar energy system generates <u>all</u> the power for the pond and <u>half</u> of the power of the house.

This is the almost inevitable second pond, an expansion of the first. Hand-dug into hard-packed DG and clay. 82 tons of soil were removed. Designed for low maintenance, it is deeper to foil the herons. A 2" deep bog planter is a bonus to the filtration and allow plants to thrive separate from the fish. Built in 2004, it has been upgraded since to improve filtration.

"Let's just keep it simple and see what happens!" After 40 years this house got a major make-over, including a new koi pond. Owner built, this was a very doable project for a small yard or just a small space, proving that inexperience and limited budgets shouldn't stop anyone. Total cost was under \$3000; admittedly, the filter and UV light came secondhand from a friend. It's the finishing touch to the patio—unobtrusive yet an eye-catcher—tied to the far end of the pool by raised planters and shade sails. And the relaxing music of splashing water can be enjoyed from indoors or out.




2008 POND TOUR RECAP Pond Number 5 and Pond Number 6

Still not big enough, the liner pond gave way to concrete and another waterfall. Design and construction has been at least a ten year process, and this may not be the final form... there is unbroken ground out there!



KHA Korner – Ammonia by Mike Anger, KHA



Water, never touch the stuff, heard Koi spawn in it..." (this is a family read newsletter).

hen we examine the health of our Koi, almost without fail predating whatever illness we diagnose is a problem with water quality. We all know this, but all too often we are lulled into a false sense of security because of the clarity of our water and the findings of a normal pH and temperature. Is that all we should be monitoring? Why is it that we spend hundreds or even thousands of dollars on fish, yet we sometimes skip the ten or twenty dollar purchase of an ammonia or nitrite test?

Remember that even a crystal clear pond might contain toxic levels of chemicals potentially lethal to your fish. while an algae bloom might look terrible (and make it difficult or impossible to see your fish) but actually might be beneficial to your fish.

Our ponds are artificial self contained ecosystems. Koi are ammonotelic, that is the majority of their nitrogenous waste is excreted by diffusion (the movement of a substance from an area of higher concentration to one of lower concentration attempting to achieve equilibrium) via the gills into the water as ammonia. Ammonia is excreted in two forms: NH3 the toxic form, and NH4+ the ionized and non-toxic form. The relationship between these two forms is greatly pH and temperature dependent. The higher (more alkaline) the pH, the greater the amount of (toxic) NH3, while the lower (more acidic) the pH, the greater the amount of (non-toxic) NH4+. The colder the water, the more NH3, the warmer, the more NH4+.

Because of Koi's body temperature and blood pH, most excreted ammonia is in the form of NH4+; this can change quickly depending upon the pond environment. Our biofilters become populated with families of bacteria that convert ammonia to nitrite. Nitrite is also a very toxic substance. Unlike ammonia, it does not come directly from Koi, but is formed almost solely in the filter or source of that family of bacteria. Because nitrite does not come from the Koi, when it contacts the Koi's gills it enters the fish by diffusion (again from the area of higher concentration, the pond, into the lower concentration of the Koi blood) binding hemoglobin in blood rendering it unable to carry

oxygen. A second population of bacteria grow in our biofilters to convert nitrite to nitrate, fairly harmless to Koi but usable by algae and plants. As the Koi eat the algae and plants, this cycle begins all over again. The bacteria that convert nitrite to nitrate are the most susceptible to aberrations in water quality and are therefore the first to decrease in number.

Causes of excess ammonia and/or nitrite may include overstocking, overfeeding, low oxygen saturation, an undersized biofilter, an immature filter (the bacterial colonies have not increased to a sufficient number yet such as in the spring), a dirty filter, a filter too aggressively or frequently cleaned (especially if tap water is used), or chemical treatments that may harm the bacteria.

Symptoms of high ammonia may include lethargy and red streaking. Symptoms of high nitrite may also include lethargy (sometimes lying on the pond bottom, though swimming up for food before going down again) and flashing.

There are two types of test kits for ammonia, Nessler and Salicylate. The former uses one drop or tablet and the color goes from clear to shades of yellow. The latter uses two steps of drops or tablets and goes from yellow to shades of blue or green. The problem with the Nessler test is that if you are using treatments in the water that bind ammonia it still reads ammonia being present while the salicylate will not. Nitrite tests usually will change from clear to purple.

Treatment for high ammonia may include water changes to dilute it, binders such as Amguel, or Zeolite rocks which absorb ammonia from the system. Remember that salt in the system greater than 0.3% will release the ammonia bound to the Zeolite.

reatment of high nitrite includes water changes, suspend feeding, salt to 0.3% and increased oxygenation.

In all cases try to address the underlying cause, especially checking your filter. In the spring check these water parameters with your test kits daily until your bacterial colonies are populated, then weekly, and when stable one each month.

These simple precautions may prevent a small problem from evolving into a disaster! *

BIOLOGICAL FILTER

A biological filter is a vital part of any pond system. This chamber (or chambers) follow the mechanical filter. A good, long-established biological filter should be home to a colony of aerobic bacteria that convert toxic ammonia to less harmful nitrates. This bacteria can be boosted with regular additions of polybac or ABA (ask your local Koi dealer).
