A year and a half ago, Theo Zoetemelk looked at the membership of IKS and made several observations: we are, for the most part, an aging group of hobbyists; we are perennially difficult to promote into positions of leadership; we need to introduce the 'next generation' to koi keeping if we hope to engage them in the hobby.

To that end, Theo brought to the IKS Board a proposal to help the Ag Department students of Norco High School to build a pond on the school grounds. A hole had already been started, but the instructor and students had hit a wall on knowing what to do next. Theo met with Carole Lindsay, the Ag instructor, and offered her the combined knowledge of several of our members, as well as their hands-on help, to teach the kids how to finish the pond and make a successful project of it. and knees dirty working on this project; their excitement never waned, even though a few graduated before the pond was finished and others took their places.

Theo led the IKS team of Deanna and Eric Fales, Larry Leverett, Brenda Aker, Tom Wright, Ed Brown and Eric Triplet, who worked with the kids hour by hour during their class time. Theo designed a four-barrel filter system and taught the kids to build it. Eric Fales, a mechanical engineer, created the drawings in CAD for reference and to provide a blueprint for future projects like this one. Rob Fales has written an article for *KotUSA*, and work has begun on a booklet detailing plans for the compete project. The ultimate goal is to interest young people — and, by extension, their parents and friends — in koi keeping, and hopefully to have other clubs across the country replicate the project in schools in their areas of influence. New younger hobbyists will keep the hobby alive.

The Ag Dept. is going to provide and prepare meat for our lunch and a small dessert bar. We are asked to bring side dishes, salads, and perhaps a few extra dessert, preferably hand-held types. And do remember your chairs! See you Sunday!



February 23, Redlands ~ Aiko Howo's Aquaponics System

Aiko's wonderful gardens and pond was a pleasant spot for our last meeting. She has been busy with more projects, putting a blue tile roof over her patio and over a new covered BBQ area, and adding an impressive aquaponics system for growing vegetables over water. The water tanks could also be used for raising edible fish such as tilapia, but she has rehomed several rescued koi instead; it's a little too cold here for the tilapia.

Aquaponics dates back to the ancient Egyptians, Aztecs, 13th century Chinese and to carp growing in rice paddies. It refers to any system combining conventional <u>aquaculture</u> (raising aquatic animals such as fish in tanks) with <u>hydroponics</u> (cultivating plants in water) in a symbiotic environment. In normal *aquaculture*, the fish excretions can accumulate in the water, increasing toxicity; but in the *aquaponic* system, the water is fed to a hydroponic system where the by-products are broken down by nitrifying bacteria, first into nitrites and subsequently into nitrates that are utilized by the plants as nutrients. Then, the water is recirculated back to the aquaculture system.


The system still needs filtration to remove solid wastes; filter media may be Matalla with nitrifying bacteria in it, or the bacteria could be in clay or gravel. Fish will eat the plant roots, but only those that grow outside their container; consider it root pruning. Many vegetables are easily and successfully raised this way. Leafy greens and herbs are the most productive plants; salad varieties such as tomatoes, cucumbers, capsicum, shallots, lettuces, chilies, red salad onions, and snow peas usually have the greatest success. Beans, cauliflower, cabbage, broccoli, eggplant and choys used for stir fries are also pretty successful and easy. Herbs such as watercress, basil, coriander, parsley, lemongrass, and sage, also work well.

Koi of the YEAR

Each Spring, all AKCA-affiliated clubs can choose a koi to be entered in an *AKCA Koi of the Year* photo contest. The only rule is that the koi should <u>not</u> be the Grand Champion from it's owner's club's show. The winning entry is then chosen at the AKCA Annual Meeting, by secret ballot, by all in attendance.

At the April meeting our club will select our Koi of the Year. To enter your favorite koi, bring a color photo (unlabeled) to the April meeting. Pictures will be assigned a number or letter ID, and be posted for viewing. Everyone will get to vote for the fish they like best. Photos can show only one fish, tubbed or in the pond. No photo -shopping, Scout's honor!

The winning photo will be sent to AKCA for judging at the Annual Meeting in June.

You have a month to get those pictures taken!

Start taking pictures now while the water is still cold, your koi are relatively inactive, and water is still clear.

AKCA Guidelines:

- Only one fish per club per year may be entered. The fish must be kept <u>at the owner's home</u>, in the owner's pond, and can be entered once per year to <u>represent only one club</u>.
- All previous "AKCA Koi of the Year" first place winners cannot be entered another year.
